- 1. Macabre: gruesome; grisly; ghastly;
- 2. Mace: ceremonial staff used as a symbol of authority;
- 3. Macerate: soften by soaking in liquid; waste away; Ex. macerate powdered wood to make paper
- 4. Machiavellian: crafty; double-dealing; of the political doctrine of Machiavelli, which holds that craft and deceit are justified in pursuing political power
- 5. Machinations: evil schemes or plots; schemes or plots to achieve an evil end; V. machinate
- 6. Maculated: spotted; stained;
- 7. Maelstrom: violent whirlpool; violent or turbulent situation;
- 8. Magisterial: authoritative; imperious; commanding; of a magistrate;
- 9. Magnanimity: generosity; ADJ. magnanimous: generous
- 10. Magnate: person of prominence or influence; powerful or influential person (in business or industry); Ex. oil magnate
- 11. Magniloquent: boastful; pompous
- 12. Maim: mutilate; injure lastingly; disable; cripple; Ex. maimed for life
- 13. Maladroit: clumsy; not skillful; awkward; bungling
- 14. Malady: illness
- 15. Malaise: uneasiness; vague feeling of ill health (without any particular pain or appearance of disease)
- 16. Malapropism: comic misuse of a word;
- 17. Malapropos: inappropriate; ADV.



- 18. Malcontent: person dissatisfied with existing state of affairs; discontented person; ADJ: discontented
- 19. Malediction: curse
- 20. Malefactor: evildoer; criminal
- 21. Malfeasance: wrongdoing; misconduct (by a public official)
- 22. Malign: speak evil of; bad-mouth(criticize spitefully); defame; ADJ: harmful; Ex. malign influence
- 23. Malingerer: one who feigns illness to escape duty; V. malinger: feign illness to avoid work
- 24. Malleable:(of a metal) capable of being shaped by pounding(beating); pliable; (of someone) impressionable(easily influenced); easily controlled; tractable
- 25. Malodorous: foul-smelling
- 26. Manacle: restrain; handcuff; N.
- 27. Maneuver: strategic military or naval movement (done for training purposes); carefully planned process; stratagem; V: carry out a military maneuver; use maneuvers in gaining an end
- 28. Manifold: many in number or kind; numerous; varied
- 29. Maraud: move in search of plunder; Ex. marauding army
- 30. Maroon: leave helpless on a deserted island or coast; ADJ. red brown
- 31. Marred: damaged; disfigured; V. mar: spoil; disfigure
- 32. Marshal: put in order; guide ceremoniously to the correct place; Ex. Marshal the children into the museum; N: military officer; official
- 33. Martinet: strict disciplinarian; person who demands total obedience to rules and orders



- 34. Martyr: one who voluntarily suffers death for his or her religion or cause; great sufferer; Ex. martyr to his rheumatism
- 35. Matriculate: enroll (in college or graduate school);
- 36. Maudlin: effusively sentimental
- 37. Maul: handle roughly; batter; injure by beating; Ex. mauled by his overexcited fans; N: heavy long-handled hammer
- 38. Mausoleum: monumental tomb; large stately tomb;
- 39. Maverick: rebel; nonconformist (in a group)
- 40. Mawkish: mushy(sentimental) and gushy; icky-sticky sentimental; excessively and objectionably sentimental
- 41. Maxim: proverb; truth pithily stated
- 42. Mayhem: injury to body; crime of willfully maiming or crippling a person; violent disorder; Ex. mayhem in the zoo;
- 43. Meager: scanty; inadequate
- 44. Meander: wind or turn in its course; follow a winding or turning course; move aimlessly and idly
- 45. Meddlesome: interfering; V. meddle: interfere
- 46. Melancholy: gloomy; morose; blue; N. ADJ. melancholic; CF. melancholia
- 47. Melee: fight
- 48. Mellifluous: (of words or a voice) sweetly or smoothly flowing; melodious; having a pleasant tune
- 49. Mendacious: lying; habitually dishonest; N. mendacity



- 50. Mendicant: beggar; ADJ: living as a beggar
- 51. Menial: suitable for servants; lowly; mean; N: someone who does menial work (esp. servant in a house)
- 52. Mercenary: motivated solely by money or gain; N.
- 53. Mercurial: capricious; quick and changing; fickle; containing the element mercury; Ex. mercurial temper;
- 54. Meretricious: flashy; tawdry; attractive on the surface but of no real value;
- 55. Metamorphosis: change of form; Ex. metamorphosis of caterpillar to butterfly; V. metamorphose: change by metamorphosis
- 56. Mete: measure; distribute; administer; Ex. mete out justice/punishment
- 57. Mettle: courage (to continue bravely in spite of difficulties); spirit; ADJ.
- 58. Microcosm: small representative world; world in miniature; Ex. microcosm of English society
- 59. Milieu: social environment; means of expression; Ex. feel out of one's milieu; Ex. His proper milieu is watercolor.
- 60. Militant: combative; bellicose; N.
- 61. Militate: work against; Ex. militate against the chances of promotion;
- 62. Minatory: menacing; threatening
- 63. Minutiae: petty or trivial details;
- 64. Mirage: unreal reflection; optical illusion
- 65. Mire: entangle; stick in swampy ground; stick or sink in mire; N: bog; deep mud; Ex. sucked deeper into the mire



- 66. Mirth: merriment; laughter
- 67. Misapprehension: error; misunderstanding; V. misapprehend
- 68. Miscellany: mixture of writings on various subjects; collection of various items
- 69. Misconstrue: interpret incorrectly; misinterpret; misjudge
- 70. Miscreant: wretch; wrongdoer; villain; Ex. kindness to the miscreant
- 71. Misgivings: doubts
- 72. Misnomer: wrong or improper name; incorrect designation
- 73. Mitigate: appease; moderate; make or become less in force or intensity
- 74. Mnemonic: pertaining to memory; assisting the memory; N: device, such as as formula or rhyme, used as a mnemonic aid
- 75. Modicum: limited quantity; small amount; Ex. He does not have a modicum of sense;
- 76. Modish: fashionable; conforming to the current fashion
- 77. Mollify: soothe an angry person
- 78. Molly: coddle pamper; coddle; baby; indulge excessively
- 79. Momentous: very important; N. moment; CF. momentary
- 80. Monastic: related to monks or monasteries; removed from worldly concerns
- 81. Monotheism: belief in one God
- 82. Moratorium: legal delay of payment or action; Ex. declare moratorium on the building of new houses
- 83. Mordant: biting; sarcastic; stinging; (apprec.) incisive; cutting; Ex. Mordant pen/wit
- 84. Morose: ill-humored; sullen; sullenly melancholy
- 85. Mortar: vessel in which substances are crushed with a pestle



- 86. Mortify: humiliate by embarrassing excessively; shame; punish the flesh; discipline (one's body) by self-denial; Ex. mortified by her blunder;
- 87. Motility: ability to move spontaneously; ADJ. motile: moving spontaneously
- 88. Muggy: (of weather) warm and damp
- 89. Mulct: defraud a person of something; swindle; Ex. mulct the boy of his legacy
- 90. Multifarious: varied; greatly diversified; Ex. multifarious activities
- 91. Mundane: worldly as opposed to spiritual; everyday; of the ordinary; Ex. mundane existence;
- 92. Munificent: very generous in giving; Ex. munificent benefactor; N. munificence
- 93. Mutability: ability to change in form; fickleness; ADJ. mutable: able to change;
- 94. Mute: silent; without speech; not pronounced; unable to speak; N: one who is incapable of speech; V: soften the sound, color, shade of
- 95. Mutinous: unruly; rebellious; Ex. mutinous teenagers; N. mutiny: open rebellion;
- 96. Myopic: nearsighted; lacking foresight; N. myopia
- 97. Myriad: very large number; ADJ.
